THE RETURN OF FERNS

There has been no end to the reporting on *Ferns*, and much of it misleading, so here is where things are at.

The Trust, Council and Artist, Neil Dawson, have been as one investigating and repairing the existing Ferns. When that proved not to be an enduring option, we began work to replace it with a new Ferns that would look exactly the same to the 'untrained eye'.

The structural problem with Ferns is the way in which the fern fronds

curl around each other, producing a weakness when suspended under tension. While this could be fixed, and was done about 5 years ago, it was going to be a costly ongoing problem.

We are working with Neil
Dawson and the engineers to
prepare a fully engineered and
costed proposal for a new work.
We expect to see this before
Christmas.

The Council will be a major funder, however, the Trust are looking to

raise the remaining money from the community once we have a final budget.

One of the fundraising possibilities is to use the sale of the existing *Ferns* to raise money. It cannot be elevated again and requires some structural work, but is still an exquisite sculpture that could sit beautifully in a private space.

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SCULPTURE UPDATE

WATER WHIRLER

The Trust is planning to make the operation of *Water Whirler* a priority as it has stood dormant for far too long. City Shaper is responsible for the work but we are talking with Athfield Architects about mechanisms and signage to stop people swinging on the pole. Early in the New Year we are hoping to have a round table discussion with all parties to resolve the mechanical issues. *Water Whirler* is too much a jewel in Wellington's crown to stay still any longer.

NGA KINA

The lights for Nga Kina have been problematic since the work was installed in November 2012. However, we have installed new underwater lights and the Kina shells can now be seen both day and night.

AKAU TANGI

All the cones of *Akau Tangi* are to be dismantled for repairs due

to failures in the section of pipe that supports the cones on the top of the poles. The location in Evans Bay doesn't make it easy on the sculpture but we expected the work to be made to cope with the conditions. It may take some considerable time before the cones are ready to go back up although we hope this will be corrected as soon as possible.

WOMAN OF WORDS

At a recent Civic Trust Awards ceremony in Wellington, *Woman* of *Words*, by Virginia King, received the People's Choice award for Best Art in the City.

ZEPHYROMETER

The wild blasts of November have given the reinstated Zephyrometer a good work out. The sculpture is safe as it is, but we don't want to frighten people. Therefore the Council is working on installing either more weight into the bulb, or putting an 11° stopper on the work so it doesn't swing to a flat horizontal position.

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4 PLINTHS 5 SCULPTURE AWARD

The contract has been signed for the 5th iteration of the 4 Plinths Sculpture Award: *a (very) brief history of aotearoa*. Tauranga based artist Kereama Taepa has begun fabrication on the work and it is due to be installed in February 2016. The opening will be on the 24th of February.
